Jackson Winsett has been named Assistant Vice President and Community Affairs Officer. He will be responsible for the Bank's [Community Development](#) Department and lead the community development team. The group focuses on promoting fair and impartial access to financial products through community research, workforce development, small business resources, education programs, and programming for minority, female and emerging community leaders. He will report to Vice President Tammy Edwards, who also serves as director of the Bank's Office of Minority and Women Inclusion.

“As we continue to grow the Bank's presence in the community, Jackson will play an integral part of cultivating impactful programming across our seven-state district,” said Edwards. “His experience will provide a valuable perspective on emerging issues that affect low- to moderate-income communities.”

Winsett joined the Bank in June 2015 as a technology manager in the Retail Payments Technology Services Division (RPTS), after having worked for several years as a business management consultant and in a range of information technology leadership roles in the telecommunications, technology and banking industries.
